# Good evening!

It is a pleasure to be here for this year's Association of Diplomatic Spouses in Namibia Gala Dinner; an event that allows us to celebrate the variety of culture and traditions of the diplomatic community in Namibia and their nationals. Thank you, ADS, for organizing this event.

# Ladies and Gentlemen,

This year's ADS theme, "children's welfare", is extremely relevant not only in Namibia, but also globally. With over

400 million children living in extreme poverty<sup>1</sup> and over 60 million primary school children out-of-school<sup>2</sup>, the need to care for, and educate children, is something that all countries must address.

Children's welfare must remain at the centre of the worlds development agenda.

To focus our efforts, member states, including Namibia, ratified the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child<sup>3</sup>. And regionally, Namibia has also committed<sup>4</sup> to the African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child<sup>5</sup>.

In 2015, world leaders adopted the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs); and pledged to leave no one behind.

Leaving no one behind, includes the 40% of Namibia's population<sup>6</sup>, that are below the age of 18.

### Ladies and Gentlemen,

Namibia has good stories to tell when it comes to children and their welfare;

- In 2015, Namibia passed the Child Care and Protection Act<sup>7</sup>, "A comprehensive legislative framework [to address] the rights of children [not] yet fully realized in Namibia".8
- The number of children benefitting from child grants, increased from roughly 4,000 in 2001 to 220,000 in 2016.9
- And in 2014, over 90% of Namibian children were enrolled in primary school.<sup>10</sup>

## However, Ladies and Gentlemen,

There is still work to be done:

- According to the Namibia Statistics Agency (NSA), nearly one in five [18%] children live in severe poverty.<sup>11</sup>
- One third [33%] of all girls, aged 15-19, have experienced physical or sexual violence 12
- And 34% of senior secondary school children are not in school, and 65% of those in school are at risk of dropping out.<sup>13</sup>

### Ladies and Gentlemen,

In Namibia, the well-being of children, is addressed through the Fifth National Development Plan (NDP5)<sup>14</sup> and the Harambee Prosperity Plan (HPP)<sup>15</sup>.

And we have all been challenged, by the SDGs, (Goal 17), and the Government (War on Poverty), to 'Harambee' in order that no one feels left out; least of all our children.
